

COMMENTS

Operating Expenditure Report

- The budget information is based on the 2023-2024 Annual Budget approved by the Board on May 9, 2023.
- The last column shows whether the salaries expense is incurred based on the School calendar (10 months), or for the whole year (12 months), or a combination of both.
- The Operating Expenditure Report reflects two months of actual District operations and one month of School operations.
- The salaries and benefits are trending as expected based on the budgeted amounts and the applicable months.
- The services and supplies are also trending as expected based on the budgeted amounts and the timing of expenditures during the fiscal year.

Special Purpose Expenditure Report

- The budget information is based on the 2023-2024 Annual Budget approved by the Board on May 9, 2023.
- The Special Purpose Expenditure Report reflects two months of actual District operations and one month of School operations.
- The Annual Facilities Grant spending for the first three months was \$279,640. At the conclusion of the projects, some amounts will be capitalized to Tangible Capital Assets and transferred to the Capital Fund, reducing the expenditure reported in the Special Purpose Fund.
- Expenditures for the Student & Family Affordability Fund will be funded from 2022-2023
 unspent amounts authorized for carryforward by the Ministry of Education and Child Care which
 total \$244,085.



10. Education

A. <u>Literacy Continuous Learning Report</u>

District Principal Malloff presented the Literary Continuous Learning Report. The 2022-2026 Literacy Action Plan is aligned to the Strategic Plan and incorporates strategic priorities such as lifelong learning, connected learners, or cultural and identity development.

School Principal Shellie Maloff from Mt. Sentinel Secondary School celebrated the work the district is doing. All schools are aligning their school learning plans to the Strategic Plan. With the Middle Years program, remarkable changes in their learners and academic success could be seen at Mt. Sentinel. Teacher Carly Christy presented the Mt. Sentinel Middle Years Program "Literacy Learning through Projects".

Superintendent Smillie highlighted the coherence across the district as roadmap, Strategic Plan, school learning plans, and continuous learning plans are aligned throughout the district.

Trustees thanked staff for their presentation and celebrated the ways "Literacy Learning through Projects" activated critical thinking among students.

B. Remembrance Day Schedule Memo

Superintendent Smillie presented the Remembrance Day schedule as provided in the agenda package. The memo provides an overview of times for assemblies at each school. Trustees and communities will receive invites from schools in their area.

C. Inclusive Education Supports

District Director of Instruction – Equity, Inclusion & Diversity Holitzki provided information on Inclusive Education Supports for students. As an inclusive system, School District No. 8 (Kootenay Lake) provides equitable access to learning for all students. Students are supported according to their individual needs.

All educational staff supports students with special needs. The classroom teacher is the primary support and responsible for designing programs – for all students in their classes. The district provides professional development for teachers to enhance their toolkit for supporting all learners.

11. Operations and Finance – Reports from the Secretary-Treasurer

A. Final Enrolment and Budget Update

Secretary-Treasurer MacArthur provided enrolment numbers from the 1701 verification process as per September 29, 2023 snapshot date and outlined implications of those numbers on the



budget. With currently 4,777 student FTEs the district is looking at flat overall enrolment compared to the prior year but an increase above originally projected by 51 student FTEs.

School District No. 8 (Kootenay Lake) Teacher Sean Marechal has received the <u>Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence</u>. Marechal teaches Grade 9 and 10 students in the <u>Valhalla</u> <u>Wilderness Program</u> at W.E. Graham School in the Village of Slocan.

Marechal has run the Valhalla Wilderness Program for the last 25 of the 27 years it has operated in the Slocan Valley. The program offers students the opportunity to explore the area they live in and build their technical skills in hiking, biking, skiing, and canoeing while following the provincial curriculum for their grades. Students spend approximately 60 per cent of school time in classrooms and 40 per cent in the field.

Marechal plans and participates in the physical challenges of adventure activities, helping students learn everything from meal planning and preparation to wilderness first-aid and avalanche awareness in an outdoor environment. Students gain leadership and group skills as they work together, problem solve, and communicate effectively to safely confront physical challenges and potentially adverse conditions, as well as contribute to the local community through Christmas food hampers and other local initiatives.

The <u>Prime Minister's Awards for Teaching Excellence</u> have recognized exceptional elementary and secondary school teachers in all disciplines since 1994, with over 1,700 teachers honoured to date. Teaching Excellence Awards recipients are honoured for their remarkable achievements in education.

SUBJECT: Inclusion and Diversity Education

For Information

Introduction

This memorandum provides an overview of Human Rights information and inclusion and diversity education in School District No. 8 (Kootenay Lake) (SD8).

Background

School districts are required to adhere to human rights legislation as outlined in the <u>Canadian Human Rights Act</u>, the <u>Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms</u>, and the <u>BC Human Rights Code</u>. Public sector employees are required to follow all three pieces of human rights legislation; this requirement includes all school district employees. Equality rights are at the core of these pieces of human rights legislation. They are intended to ensure that everyone is treated with the same respect, dignity and consideration (i.e. without discrimination), regardless of personal characteristics such as race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, sex, age, or mental or physical disability, sexual orientation, gender, residency, marital status or citizenship.

Human rights legislation helps to foster a society in which there are no impediments to full and free participation in the economic, social, political and cultural life of each person in Canadian society. As well, human rights legislation promotes a climate of understanding and mutual respect where all citizens are equal in dignity and rights, prevents discrimination prohibited by the legislation, and identifies and eliminates persistent patterns of inequality associated with prohibited discrimination.

Districts and schools are legally obligated to keep all children and youth safe and create safe spaces for students. Every adult in the K-12 system carries the responsibility to proactively create safe, caring, and inclusive learning environments for all students and support experiences of safety, dignity, and respect. It is also important that every adult in the K-12 system feels that their own safety and well-being is supported at school or workplace.

The Ministry of Education and Child Care is responsible for the creation of BC curriculum. Inclusion and diversity education is a lens which is embedded throughout the K-12 curriculum and school activities and outlined in the Ministry of Education and Child Care's <u>Diversity policy</u>. <u>BC's K-12 curriculum</u> includes a focus on valuing diversity and respecting differences, as well as human rights and responses to discrimination. Teachers, schools, and school districts may explore the BC Human Rights Code within those themes including, but not necessarily limited to, sexual orientation and gender identity. This means that in all curricular areas, students and teachers explore the topics of human rights what it means to value diversity and respect differences, and how to respond to discrimination on the basis of all diverse identities, including sexual orientation and gender identity.



Teachers may include discussions around the <u>BC Human Rights Code</u>, sexual orientation and gender identity with students. Topics related to gender and sexual identity are included in the curriculum for knowledge, as well as to help students understand and respect diversity. Teachers have been teaching this curriculum for years. However, there is a legitimate need for increasing awareness of inclusion and diversity, and for the curriculum and school environments to be as safe and inclusive as possible for students, staff, and families of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

There are many resources that support educators in addressing human rights, inclusion, and diversity. These resources help schools create safe, caring and inclusive learning environments for all students regardless of their race, culture, religion, sexual orientation or gender identity and expression. Moreover, the presence of inclusion and diversity-specific anti-bullying policies improves the school climate for 2SLGBTQ+, heterosexual and cisgender students, increasing inclusion and diversity, improving physical and mental health, and reducing discrimination for all students.

Everyone has a sexual orientation and gender identity. The Ministry of Education and Child Care outlines its expectations with regard to supporting gender identity and expression in school districts in its Sexual Orientation Gender Identity (SOGI) information through the erase (expect tespect & a safe education) website.

Information

Written in September 2022, the Minister [of Education and Child Care]'s and K-12 Education Partners statement on support for SOGI identifies that each child expresses themselves in their own unique way and that no student should be excluded or bullied because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression. The statement commits the Minister and K-12 education partners to ensure every school is a place where all students are welcomed, included and respected in a safe learning environment, while being fully and completely themselves.

In 2016, the BC Human Rights Code was amended to ensure that gender identity and expression are protected under the code. BC school districts, independent schools and First Nations schools are required to have inclusive and diverse codes of conduct and policies in place. All BC school districts are participants in the B.C. SOGI Educator Network. Provincially, a collaboration amongst K-12 education partners and the ARC Foundation has created the Provincial K-12 SOGI Collaborative, officially committing to creating learning environments that are safe, respectful and welcoming for all BC students.

B.C.'s curriculum includes a focus on valuing diversity and respecting differences, and the topics of human rights and responses to discrimination. Teachers, schools and school districts may explore the BC Human Rights Code within those themes including, but not necessarily limited to, sexual orientation and gender identity.

Topics related to gender and self-identity are included in the curriculum for knowledge, as well as to help students understand and respect diversity, as with the previous curriculum. Sexual and reproductive health is specifically covered within the Physical and Health Education curriculum. There is an Alternative Delivery procedure that enables students and their parents/guardians to



consult with their school and choose means other than regular classroom instruction to address the learning standards in this area.

In SD8, <u>Administrative Procedure 1101 Sexual Orientation / Gender Identity (SOGI)</u> outlines the procedures that school district staff must follow in order to provide a safe, positive, and inclusive learning and working environment for all students and employees regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

School district staff:

- Ensure full inclusion of all students and employees in all aspects of school life regardless
 of their sexual orientation or gender identity, including the right for students to
 participate in all activities;
- Define appropriate terms, behaviours, and actions to prevent discrimination, harassment, and exclusion through greater awareness of, and responsiveness to, their harmful effects;
- Ensure that complaints about discrimination based on protected human rights are taken seriously and dealt with effectively and in a timely fashion through consistently applied policy and administrative procedures; and
- Raise awareness and improve understanding of the lives of individuals who are discriminated against, harassed, excluded, or feel unsafe based on their sexual orientation or gender identity.

A great deal of misinformation and disinformation about teaching and topics related to gender and sexuality is circulating in our communities at present, much of that on social media channels. Each parent with a concern is asked to find out exactly what their child is being taught and what discussions are happening in classrooms. They are encouraged to discuss with their child's classroom teacher and to continue to pay close attention to school and teacher communication with families. Families that would like more specific information about student learning, classroom processes or any other topic related to their child's education, can reach out directly to their child's teacher.

Teachers inform families of upcoming classroom topics and highlight those that may be of particular interest to parents and caregivers. It is neither practical nor possible to notify each parent or family member of each instance in which a student asks about something related to gender, pride, sexuality, or pronouns in the classroom. These discussions may happen spontaneously among students, or topics may arise as part of another lesson plan. Our district Administrative Procedure 2004 for Alternate Delivery of Curriculum helps parents to work with schools for alternate methods of delivery for sensitive issues. Learning Resources always follow BC Ministry of Education and Child Care guidelines. Learning resources are vetted and those used are part of the Focused Education resources.

The values of inclusivity, diversity and basic human rights are woven through B.C. schools to make sure every child feels welcome to our school, ready to learn, and knows how to make sure other students feel welcome as well. Here are some additional resources that address these values: Elementary Supporting Student Health Guide and B.C. SOGI-123 website.

Like all school districts in B.C. and across Canada, School District 8 Kootenay Lake is required to follow provincial and federal legislation that relates to the curriculum.



Conclusion

Students are entitled to learning environments free of discrimination so they can thrive and succeed in their school years and beyond. SD8 adheres to Canadian and British Columbian human rights legislation through creating and protecting inclusive and caring learning communities that recognize, celebrate, and support the diversity of all students and staff.
